“One of the signs of delusion is sadness over the loss of obedience coupled with the absence of resolve to bring it back to life.”

“Contraction and expansion are spiritual states of being, though they do have psychological repercussions, such as sadness and joy. They are alternating states along the path, similar in their succession to the cycles of nights and days. Contraction is related to the fear (khawf) of God, expansion to hope (rajaa’) in God; and on a higher plane, contraction has to do with the Divine Majesty or Rigor (al-jalal), expansion with the Divine Beauty (al-jamal), two aspects of the Divine unity.”

“The ego attaches itself to the exterior forms, the intellect going straight to their interior essences.”

“Suffices it as a recompense to you for obedience that He has judged you worthy of obedience.”

“When He gives, He shows you His kindness (birr); when He deprives, He shows you His power (qahr). And in all that, He is making Himself known to you.”  
“Fire is the test of gold; adversity, of strong men.”  
“To know where to find a thing is in reality the best

part of learning.”

“Try not to become a man of success but a man of value.”

“No man is clever enough to know all the evil he does.”

“The great act of faith is when a man decides that he is not God.”

“The foundation of all foundations, the pillar supporting all wisdoms, is the recognition of the reality of God.”

“Live to seek God, and life will not be without God.”

“A great man is he who has not lost the heart of a child.”

“When we cannot find contentment in ourselves, it is useless to seek it elsewhere.”

“Great souls suffer in silence.”

“Life is beautiful when one sees beyond it.”

“Self-conquest is the greatest of victories.”

“God is the truth and light is his shadow.”

“He who is not prepared today will be less tomorrow.”

“Avoid frequent disputes about lesser truths, and a religion that lies only in opinions.”

“They are usually least acquainted with a heavenly life, who are violent disputers about the circumstantial of religion. He whose religion is all in his opinions, will be most frequently and zealously speaking his opinions.”

“Avoid foolish questions, and genealogies, and contentions, and strivings about the law; for they are unprofitable and vain.”

“There is too much of hell abiding in thee, to have any acquaintance with heaven; your soul is too like the devil, to have any familiarity with God. A proud man makes himself his god, and sets up himself as his idol.”

“A slothful spirit is another impediment to this heavenly life... Reader, heaven is above thee, and do you think to travel this steep ascent without labor and resolution?”

“Be convinced that heavens is the only treasure and happiness, and labor to know what a treasure and happiness it is... This conviction must sink into your affections; for if it be only a notion, it will have little efficacy.”

“From Descartes to Kant, and to contemporary investigations in phenomenology and neuroscience, Western thinking tends to posit spirituality as a phenomenon of the mind, not as an inquiry into transcendent realities.”

“Religion performs spirituality theatrically and the theatricality of religion makes spirituality real and gives it an ontological charge.”

“Prayer is love in need appealing to love in power.”

“He that flees from prayer flees from all that is good.”

“The secrecy of the constancy of grace and virtue lies in the perseverance in prayer.”

“Prayer is the secret of power.”

“The point of asking is that you may get to know God better.”

“It is in vain to expect our prayers to be heard if we do not strive as well as pray.”

“Whatsoever we beg of God, let us also work for it.”

“Satan dreads nothing but prayer.”

“The one concern of the devil is to keep the saints from praying. He fears nothing from our prayerless studies/work/activity. He laughs at our toil, mocks our wisdom, but trembles when we pray.”

“You cannot alter the Will of God, but the man of prayer can discover God’s Will.”

“Dulce et utile: sweet and useful; the ultimate goal of poetry is to please and instruct, seduce and educate, entertain and teach.”

“As we study the facts of the world outside we feel they imply that a Creative Intelligence is working at the heart of things. As we study the facts of the world within – the realm of thought, feeling, and inner experience – we feel these facts too point toward some Reality beyond ourselves.”

“God cannot be asked to justify His commands or indeed provide motives for His acts at all: {He is not to be asked about what He does; it is they who are to be asked}... But He both binds Himself by the Covenant and explains His reasons for commands.”

“We read in the Holy Qur’an, {vie with one another in good deeds}, knowing that when all return to Him, He will sort out the religious differences and disagreements. So engage and even challenge other religious communities through acts of goodness and virtue rather than by seeking a human resolution of religious differences in life. Seek common ground, avoid chauvinistic or exclusivist claims that reject the religious beliefs of others. Religious sincerity, virtue, and goodness are the ultimate determinant of divine

judgment.”

“When Demosthenes was asked what was the first part of an orator, what the second, and what the third? he answered, ‘Action’.”

“When man closes his lips God begins to speak.”

“It is not a little thing to know oneself.”

“Real humility is the one which arises from the contemplation of His sublimity and the illumination of His attributes.”

“Only the contemplation of His attributes can dislodge you from your attributes.”

“How can you seek recompense for a deed He bestowed upon you out of charity? How can you seek recompense for a sincerity He gave you as a gift?”

“He made you a witness before He asked you to give witness.”

“Many a life is long in years but meager in fruits, and many a life is short in years but rich in fruits.”

“Society cannot exist unless a controlling power upon

will and appetite be placed somewhere... It is ordained in the eternal constitution of things that men of intemperate minds cannot be free. Their passions forge their fetters.”

“The proper function of a government is to make it easy for people to do good and difficult for them to do evil.”

“Wisdom is an all-purpose aid to creating heaven on earth.”

“Wisdom is a mode of cognition – one rooted in perspectives, interpretations, and values.”

“Wisdom is not about facts per se; it is about the meaning of facts. It is about the significance of facts and their implications. Wisdom is a kind of meta-knowledge.”

“Wisdom can be developed intentionally.”

“By introducing ‘the values of the wise’ into the internal guidance systems of society’s institutions, we create heaven on earth.”

“God manifests everything because He is the interior (al-batin), and He conceals the existence of everything because He is the exterior (al-zahir).”

“The creation is manifested because He is the interior, the hidden source from which all manifestation proceeds. On the other hand, the creation is hidden because He is the exterior, more manifest or more real than the symbolic nature of the world that points to Him.”

“Only His extreme nearness to you is what veils God (al-haqq) from you.”

It is “the fool” indeed, that, “hath said in his heart, there is no God.”

“The atheist is a kind of Felo-de-se; for, according to his notion, his own existence is as much an uncertainty as anything else.”

“Is it not admirable, that from the twenty-four letters of our alphabet, all the new words in the English language are formed; all the ideas conceived in the arts and sciences are expressed; and controversies on all

subjects, natural, moral, and religious, are maintained: so that by the wonderful faculty of reason, a man can employ those few letters as it pleases him, either in defending truth, or exposing error; In exciting doubt, or convincing the understanding: what an important lesson, then, rightly to learn our letters.”

on the mercy and grace of a forgiving God... True repentance leads the penitent to abhor himself; and the more he feels of its influence, the lower he sinks in self-abhorrence and humiliation.”

“Acquire virtuous habits.”

“Associate with the wise.”

“Avoid all extremes.”

“Accuse not the absent.”

“A clear conscience is health to the

soul.” “Anger is a real approach to

insanity.” “All who swim in sin, sink in

sorrow.” “A virtuous mind loathes

flattery.” “Accustom thyself to method.”

“Abundance seldom lessens our wants.”

“Be not proud even of well-doing.”

“Be more ready to hear than to speak.”

“Be deaf to distraction.”

“Be not ungrateful.”

“Bad actions mostly lead to worse.”

“Concupiscence is an ardent, usually sensual, longing – In Catholic theology, concupiscence is seen as a desire of the lower appetite contrary to reason... it is an orientation, inclination, or innate tendency of human beings to long for fleshy appetites.”

“Concupiscence is related to the term ‘nafs‘ in Arabic.”

“In Judaism, there is an early concept of ‘yetzer hara‘ or evil inclination to do evil or violate the will of God... the yetzer hara is not the product of original sin as in Christian theology, but the tendency of humanity to misuse the natural survival needs of the physical body. Therefore, the natural need of the body for food becomes gluttony, rest becomes sloth, etc.”

“Thomas Aquinas described two divisions of sensuality: the concupiscible (pursuit/avoidance instincts) and the irascible (competition/aggression/defence) instincts. The former is associated with the emotions of joy, sadness, love and hate, desire and repugnance. The latter, daring and fear, hope, despair and anger.”

“Characteristics of the (lower)

nafs: 1-Pride

2-Greed

3-Envy

4-Lust

5-Backbiting

6-Stinginess

7-Malice”

“If you do not guard your intellect you cannot attain purity of heart, so as to be counted worthy to see God.”

“Hesychia being a state of mind or inner tranquility is mirrored by an outer state of withdrawal from the world.”

“Hesychia opens the intellect to divine knowledge, brings about fear and love of God, is the pathway to heaven.”

“Whosoever walks towards God one cubit, God runs towards him twain.”

“God is the One in Whom all is lost and yet the One in Whom all is found.”

“The bravest sight in the world is to see a great man struggling against adversity.”

“Celsus was a second-century Greek philosopher and opponent of early Christianity. He is known for his literary work “On the True Doctrine” which is the earliest known criticism of Christianity. It was written

in 175 to 177, shortly after the death of Justin the Martyr and was a response to his work.”

“Celsus wanted the Christians to be good citizens, to retain their own belief but worship the emperors and join their fellow citizens in defending the empire.”

“One of Celsus’ most bitter complaints is of the refusal of Christians to cooperate with civil society and their contempt for local customs and the ancient religions. He viewed them as the work of Daemons... He accused them of converting the vulgar and ignorant while refusing to debate wise men.”

“Celsus blames Moses for the corruption of the ancient Egyptian religion, he wrote, “The goatherds and shepherds who followed Moses as their leader were deluded by clumsy deceits into thinking that there was only one God, and without any rational cause... These goatherds and shepherds abandoned the worship of many gods.”... Celsus described the Christians as swarms of bats or ants creeping out of their nest, or worms in conventicle in a corner of the mud.”

“The absent are always in the wrong.”

“He that fears you present will hate you absent.”

“If a person is away, his right is away.”

“An ill marriage is a spring of ill-fortune.”

“Adversity makes a man wise not rich.”

“Woes unite foes.”

“Adversity is the touchstone of virtue.”

“From birth to two years the child finds his deity in his parents. They stand to him in the place of God. It is very important that the mental impression made on the child during

these first two years be one of love... It is easier to teach 'God is love' to the child who has adored and known nothing but love from his parents."

“Nearly all the ills of our contemporary life spring from one simple fact: it is the feeling that something has been left out, and that something is faith.”

“The steadying sense of God’s presence is the supreme need of life.”

“We have had too much random living. We have refused to commit ourselves to something beyond ourselves.”

“Frustrations, inner strain, and wishful thinking have been caused by purposeless living.”

“We have become dilettants and triflers, we take life too casually. It is this playing with ideas rather than giving ourselves to them which has brought the fatal flaw to modern life.”

“Trifling is ranked among the venial faults... A life devoted to trifles not only takes away the inclination but the capacity for higher pursuits... The mind is absorbed with what is vicious and what is useless.”

“Those who are rendered unhappy by trivial troubles, sin seek comfort in trivial enjoyment.”

“Seek God. Our heart is the true ‘terra incognita’: A land more foreign and unknown to us than the regions of the polar circle: yet that heart is the place in which an acquaintance with God must be sought.”

“God threatens, not to punish, but, by the warning, to

snatch us from punishment.”

“Let our aims be lofty, though our attainments are low.”

“True greatness consists in being great in little things.”

“The best way to begin doing great things is to improve the doing of the little things.”

“Through ages, through eternity, what you have done for God, that, and only that, you are. Deeds never die.”

“Thou shalt not belittle your child.”

“A classic is a classic because of a certain eternal and irrepressible freshness.”

“Classic, a book which people praise and don't read.”

“When you reread a classic you do not see more in the book than you did before; you see more in you than there was before.”

“Those who bestow too much application on trifling things become generally incapable of great ones.”

“It is Satan's custom by small sins to draw us to

greater, as a wisp of straw enkindles a block of wood.”

“Do not waste five-dollar time on a five-cent job.”

“Nails and pegs are little things, but they hold the parts of a large building together.”

“The idea of God’s revelation to human beings is central to both Christianity and Islam. It is not unusual to hear Muslims describe Christians as People of the Book (ahl al-kitaab) or best understood as People of Scripture. For both Christians and Muslims, faith rests in an affirmation that there is a God Who reveals.”

“Revelation is the self-disclosure of God. Thus God is both its source and its content... God’s self-disclosure gives knowledge of God’s will or disposition toward us... through God’s self-disclosing activity we learn God’s purpose and precepts for our lives, God’s judgments, God’s grace. God’s revelation open to us a way of life, of reconciliation, peace, and joy, of worship and service, love and justice.”

“Islam, like Christianity, affirms that revelation communicates the nature of God, and agrees that this nature is not fully communicable. Limited human intelligence cannot know God’s essence. Faith affirms the human inability to express or understand the fullness of God.”

“Muslims see in creation a ‘text’ that teaches the believer about the ways in which God has ordered, bestowed, and planted love and mercy within all of life.”

“In the Qur’an, Muslims hold, God completes and corrects all earlier revelations, and uncovers the ‘straight path’ which God has given humanity to walk.”

“The Scriptures teach us the best way of living, the noblest way of suffering, and the most comfortable way of dying.”

“If we search God’s Word we will find that it is full of priceless spiritual jewels.”

“The Word of God only can keep us from the snares.”

“A reverent study of the Word of God opens the way for the mightiest prayer.”

“Let no inward feeling or outward sign dissuade you from your voluntary choice to count God’s Word true, to yourself.”

“God’s love enables you to love God.”

“All that we have to make sure of is that we keep

ourselves in the love of God.”

“The nearer the soul gets to God, the more its own imperfections are revealed and the more wonderful God’s love appears.”

“The love of God finds us ruined sinners, and leaves us, glorified saints.”

“Divine love increases in us, the more we pour out.”

“The fire of God’s love in our hearts will teach us more about God than all the theologians in the world.”

“God has left the human will free to choose or refuse, and the blood of every lost sinner shall be upon his own head.”

“A true fear of hell has sent many a soul to heaven.”

“When you have God’s glory on the inside, it will come to the outside.”

“When we confess our human insufficiency, then God can display His power in us.”

“Humanity without the restraining grace of God is as corrupt, as degraded, as the inhabitants of hell itself.”

“God’s way of exalting His servant is contrary to the flesh.”

“The more Job was persecuted, the stronger he got.”

“So often God has a peculiar way of testing and trying His people.”

“God keeps a school for His servants here on earth, and one of the best teachers is disappointments.”

“If we only saw deep enough, the chastisement of God would be sweeter than the praises of men.”

“You can’t build characters without testing them.”

“God’s ways are at times like heavy wagon tracks and they cut deep into our souls. Yet they are all of them mercy.”

“What is life but a glad, present consciousness of God and self and duty, and hearty obedience thereto.”

“Empty the cup of your life, and God will fill it with His.”

“Your life is what God wants. It is of the highest price.”

“What a God of love He is, Who longs for even the poor miserable love we have to give.”

“God’s love is beyond the explanation of any pen or tongue.”

“The only way to show our love to God is by keeping His Commandments.”

“Love is the only thing that can truly and perfectly obey God.”

“Love is the greatest thing God can give us.”

“God wants your love more than your labor.”

“Faith seeks the glory that ‘comes from God’ – that only comes where God is all.”

“God wants His faithful to act like Him.”

“If we do not fear God, we will never truly love Him.”

“No power on earth can make you commit a sin unless you choose to do so.”

“There are temptations that come from the breaking up of plans.”

“Our severest temptation will come to us after our greatest blessings.”

“Meet the enemy with the truth that God cannot fail, and what He has begun, He will finish.”

“The stronger the purpose of fidelity to God, the stronger the pressure the enemy will bring to bear.”

“It is while you are resisting little temptations that you are growing stronger.”

“Joseph’s character and faith did not shield him from temptation, but they kept him from yielding to it.”

“We confront the devil every time we attempt anything for God.”

“When we come to a place where we see nothing but God, our enemies are forced to withdraw.”

“Witnesses do not talk of the doubts, but the certainties.”

“Ask God to put in your life supernatural things that

will themselves be His witness to your testimony and commend it to an unbelieving world.”

“Go to God, heart foremost.”

“A religion that neglects heart disease will always fall short.”

“Knees that are hardened by prayer make a soft heart.”

“When we speak of the soul, we mean that which thinks, feels, and lives.”

“The human soul was made for God. He alone can satisfy it.”

“A single ‘yes’ or ‘no’, turns the scale of the destiny of a soul.”

“Willingness to believe is usually half the fight of faith.”

“We need decision for the soul.”

“You can will yourself off the devil’s territory, and will yourself into the hands of God.”

“There is great strength in a life of trust in God.”

“‘Be strong, be strong’ – how the Bible echoes with the inspiring command.”

“We must take God’s gifts in God’s ways, although His ways are not always as we would wish.”

“There is only room for one to rule upon the throne of the heart, and self must disappear before God will reign.”

“When I surrendered all, then the eternal God took hold of me.”

“Sometimes the philosophy has a different label – scientism, materialism, or agnosticism. Call it what you will, each secular funhouse has its own reflection, and each is a distortion of man created in the image of God.”

“Pseudoscience’s attempt to prove that man is just a glorified animal, differing in degree but not in kind from lower animals... Pseudoscience gave us the monkey-man, then came Karl Marx with his machine-man. Making a virtue of his own ideological necessities, Marx defined society by its economic character and left God out of consideration altogether. Somewhat later, Sigmund Freud evolved the dream

man.”

“Once secularism infects a people, it advances to a virulent stage, like a progressive disease. It takes the form of state-ism or totalitarianism. That is, it denies that the government is a man’s agent for the protection of God’s gifts. It is a vicious philosophy which holds that man exists for the state, and not the state for man.”

“The natural law is impressed on every man and woman by the Creator. It is made known solely by reason. In each of us is a little spark of divine fire. It enables us to judge certain acts as good or bad; it tells us to do good and avoid evil... We call this divine spark, ‘conscience’.”

“The conditions of modern life seem to forbid that a grain of poetry be left in our brain, a spark of noble passion in our heart. The ugly, the hard, the vulgar, and the vile are the passion of our prison-house.”

“There is the larger thought that arises from the contemplation of God’s work, and never was there more pressing need of the larger thought than today. Our age is specially materialistic, industrial, mechanical, commercial.”

“It is sad to think how little this glorious world means to the mass of us! Weary and sickened with ephemeral things, absurd ambitions and pleasures, irritating trifles,

disheartening commonplaces of scenes and experience... only as we delight in the work of God can we delight in our work and find rest to our soul.”

“Thinking imperially, recognizing ourselves in mankind, and becoming its helper, we taste a pure, vast joy impossible to a life centered in mean egotism and the narrow sphere of personal interests.”

“The preacher and Prometheus have one thing in common: Each must carry the divine fire to man.”

“The popular bewilderment opens the way to charlatans and demagogues in the religious world as well as in other professions. When people are confused any Pied Piper with some new ideology can mislead them in politics, in business, and in religion.”

“The doors of wisdom are never shut.”

“Wisdom is not finally tested in schools.”

“Man’s chief wisdom consists in knowing his follies.”

“The mark of wisdom is to read the present aright.”

“Wisdom adorns riches and shadows poverty.”

“To flee from folly is the beginning of wisdom.”

“Wisdom is the only liberty.”

“A just war is better than an unjust peace.”

“For what can war but endless war still breed?”

“He that preaches war is the devil’s chaplain.”

“War is death’s feast.”

“War is the child of pride.”

“War seldom enters but where wealth allures.”

“Money is the sinews of war.”

“The fear of war is worse than war itself.”

“Gold and riches, the cause of war.”

“Wars, hateful to mothers.”

“Talk of the war, but do not go to it.”

“There are three kinds of lies; lies, damned lies, and statistics.”

“Agnosognosia: is a pathological defect of self-awareness, a condition in which a person is unaware of an obvious personal disability or injury.”

“Plato’s troglodytes lack self-knowledge. they are unaware they are prisoners, oblivious to being manipulated by others, deluded by illusions about the world, and ignorant of their own capacities and possibilities where false knowledge is deeply embedded and so life-pervasive, disillusionment becomes impossible without assistance.”

“To think is to doubt; that is, to be perplexed to question, and sift into the reason for things. To think more is to doubt less. To think clearly through is to find the truth. Enough truth can always be found to rest upon while more is coming. One never finds all of the truth. It is one of the delights of living to be always finding more of truth. This, too, will be one of the great delights of the upper after-life. There will always be the zest of finding new treasures.”

“Some people never doubt because they live in that sweet, peaceful atmosphere, made by their elders or others who have doubted, and thought, and thought through, and now rest upon the rock of found truth.”

“There are two sorts of doubters; those that are not doubters at all but like to be called so, and then there are the honest doubters. The first sort is better called quibblers. When they search it is simply for something that will bolster up the opinion they hold... They pick out the flaws and faults of believers – and seem to take pleasure in pointing them out... The real doubter is not absorbed in what he does not believe... He is concerned about finding out what should be believed. He is digging for facts... he inquires, he goes about with his eyes and ears more open than his mouth... He will admit himself wrong when new light shows that he is. That is always a hard thing to do, nothing is much harder... It wounds one’s intellectual pride very sorely. And then the final test of the real, true doubter is this, that as the light comes he will allow it to govern his habits, his life. Here is the test that drops many a man out of the ranks... that may mean radical changes. it may cost friendships, income, and standing. But that will not deter the true man. Jesus said: “He that is willing to do... shall know.”

“The one whose disposition is quiet is not disquieted as others are, but neither does he show any activeness of spirit to sanctify the name of God in his affliction. But, on the other hand, he whose contentment is of grace is not disquieted and keeps his heart quiet with regard to vexation and trouble, and at the same time is not dull or heavy but very active to sanctify God’s name in the affliction that he is experiencing.”

“I will give you just one mark of the difference between a man or woman who is content in a natural way and one who is content in a spiritual way: Those who are content in a natural way overcome themselves when outward afflictions befall them and are content: They are just as content when they commit sin against God or when God is dishonored... But a gracious heart that is contented with its affliction, will rise up strongly when God is dishonored.”

“Contentment is taking pleasure in God’s disposal. This is so when I am well pleased in what God does, in so far as I can see God in it, though, I may be sensible of the affliction, and may desire that God in his due time would remove it... Yet I am well pleased with God’s hand that I see good in this affliction.”

“Since the day of Esau to the present time, two classes of people existed upon this earth, the one class who live by honest labor, the other who live off of honest labor.”

“Some men choose home to spit their spleen and uncork the bottle of their discontent, which all day long they have been filling. Rather in the world where no one thinks enough of you to feel bad about it; but remember there is one at home who can be made to suffer as no one else in this wide world. If you have one smile, save it for your wife at home.”

“When God lays a newborn babe in the arms of a wedded pair, he says to them, “Take this child and nurse it for me, and I will give you your wages.” And the answer of gratitude and faith should be, “O God, thou hast put thy noblest work into our hands. We accept the precious trust. We will try to stamp on the soft, plastic heart the impress of a godly example. We will shelter this young life under thy mercy-seat. We will bear with it as thou bearest with us. We will be truthful, that it may never learn falsehood. We will nurse this soul in its infancy with the ‘sincere milk’ of love, that in after years may bear ‘strong meat’ for strong service of God and righteousness. O, God! make our lives in harmony with Thee, that this young life may reflect thine in reflecting ours.”

“Opportunities, like eggs, must be hatched when they are fresh. The showers from heaven must be caught as they fall.”

“The moral man is negative. He does not swear, he does not steal, and he does not murder, and he does not drink; and his whole life is not. His language is, ‘Thou shall not.’”

“A bird upon the wing may carry a seed that shall add a new species to the vegetable family of a continent; and just so, a word, a thought, from a flying soul, may have results immeasurable, eternal.”

“Beauty will save the world.”

“Art is frequently seen as the epitome of human creativity and the deepest expression of the human spirit. Further, art brings an added dimension of beauty.”

“In a sense, art is a technology... Creativity in art emerges in the interactive synthesis of artist, materials, and tools.”

“One could argue that the purpose of art is to create beauty, and that beauty is a ‘synthesis’ of diverse elements into a harmonious or congruent element.”

“Art is an aesthetic experience involving both cognitive and emotional features.”

“As a general rule upbeat emotions such as love, hope, enthusiasm, and courage positively impact human thinking – including creativity. Whereas negative emotions such as anxiety, sadness, and depression damp out effective and creative thinking.”

“Unequal distribution of the products of labor is one of the most fruitful sources of social and political disturbances”

“The Indian Removal Bill: legalized crime, legalized

robbery, legalized vice.”

“Civic literacy is when “The question of justice” becomes central to “The question of politics.”

“A penny will hide the biggest star in the universe if you hold it close enough to your eye.”

“Fortune does not change men but unmask them.”

“The most important things in life are not things.”

“Put your trust in money, put your money in trust.”

“I am not against wealth, I am against wealth that enslaves.”

“A man’s treatment of money is the most decisive test of his character – how he makes it and how he spends it.”

“The rich man carries God in his pocket, the poor in his heart.”

“Make money your god and it will plague you like the devil.”

“Money does the most good if you do something preventive rather than something remedial.”

“Real riches are riches possessed inside.”

“Money is like seawater, the more we drink, the thirstier we become.”

“The man who dies leaving behind him millions of available wealth will pass away ‘unwept, unhonored, and unsung.’”

“Surplus wealth is a sacred trust which its possessor is bound to administer in the lifetime for the good of the community.”

“Prevailing prayer implies and embodies all works, as the seed embodies the trunk, roots, branches, flowers, and fruitage of the tree. The history of piety is the history of prayer. All piety begins, continues, and ends in prayer.”

“The most interesting sight in this world is a man in the act of prayer. The angels of God look with wonder, and the Lord of angels bends His lofty throne and exclaims: ‘Behold, he prayeth.’”

“Prayer is intimately associated with man’s salvation, and without it, we cannot be saved.”

“Individuals high in anxious attachment strongly crave acceptance and validation from others, they tend to be chronically rejection sensitive and are thus hypervigilant for potential signs of exclusion.”

“Individuals high in avoidant attachment tend to not value relationships highly and claim to prefer independence. However, research suggests that this stance of self-reliance is a defensive response to the fear of rejection and abandonment. We propose another strategy that avoids relationships because of the underestimation of potential social reward... Low perceptions of social reward can help minimize exposure to potentially rejecting situations without the need to acknowledge a fear of rejection.”

“Experiences of rejection lead to higher levels of social withdrawal whereas experiences of being ignored lead to higher levels of social engagement.”

“According to Aristotle, it is not possible to be practically wise without moral excellence.”

“Good teaching is 1/4 preparation and 3/4 theater.”

“What was the duty of the teacher if not to inspire.”

“A teacher affects eternity; he can never tell where his

influence stops.”

“It is the supreme art of the teacher to awaken joy in creative expression and knowledge.”

“The curriculum is so much necessary raw material, but warmth is the vital element for the growing plant and for the soul of the pupil.”

“You must train the students to their studies in a playful manner and without any air of restraint.”

“He who prays in faith enlists Almighty God, all the armies of heaven, and every law of the universe, in the interests of his cause.”

“Once the power, authority, and authenticity of the Source of revelation have been established, all subsequent commands from that Source, however laconic, are logically valid.”

“God’s Commandments come with answers to the question why?”

“Commandments by definition do not require a designated audience, because they apply to all. “O People”... More complex are commands that apply only under certain conditions to subgroups such as travelers, debtors, pilgrims, etc...”

“Imperatives in the Qur’an are used

to: 1- challenge (10:38)

2- reproach (23:65)

3- condemn (8:50)

4- call for help (7:51)

5- pray (1:6)

6- create (16:40)”

“Commands are orders, directives, injunctions, instructions, prohibitions, and prescriptions.”

“The author of a valid command must have some entitlement or authority... There must also be a good reason for the command, it must be ‘rational, sound, or sensible’ providing a rational and reasonable answer to the question ‘why?’”

“Soliloquy is preaching to one’s own self; for as every good master or father of a family is a good preacher to his own family, so every believer is a good preacher to his own soul.”

“In our meditations intermix soliloquy and prayer, sometimes speaking to our own hearts, and sometimes to God... We need one, as well as other, and therefore, shall wrong ourselves by neglecting either. Besides, the mixture of them, like music, will be more engaging.”

“The soul’s connection with the body is just that of the bird’s to its nest. The bird leaves it joyfully to fly in the air.”

“Next in importance to the acknowledgment of the existence of a Supreme Being is a right understanding and appreciation of His attributes.”

“It is important to make the attributes of God the frequent subject of deep, mature reflection and patient study.”

“He is infinitely, impartially, immutably, and everlastingly good.”

“Whatever the creator does, or designs to do, it is certain to be influenced by His pure Goodness.”

“Love your parents if they are just, otherwise tolerate them.”

“To love one’s parents is the first law of nature.”

“Affection for parents is the foundation of every virtue.”

“The son follows the father’s religion.”

“Descent to hell is easy and fast.”

“You might look up one night and see a faint blur in the sky that is the Andromeda galaxy – our nearest spiral neighbor; more than 2 million light-years away. The light that reaches your retina now left Andromeda more than 2 million years ago, long before Homo Sapiens walked on earth. So the Andromeda we see today is really old news, 2 million years stale.”

“What do we really observe? Relativity theory has returned the answer – we only observe relations. Quantum theory returns another answer – we only observe probabilities.”

“The fundamental truths are based on symmetry, and there is a deep kind of beauty in that.”

“The number of molecules in a pint of water placed end to end would form a chain of encircling the Earth over 200 million times.”

“A pinhead heated to the temperature of the Center of the Sun would emit enough heat to kill anyone who ventured within a thousand miles of it.”

“In a now-classic series of studies, Stanford psychologist Amos Tversky and colleague Daniel

Kahneman concluded that most people will bend over backward to avoid small risks, even if that means sacrificing great potential rewards. “The threats of a loss has a greater impact on a decision than the possibility of an equivalent gain,” they concluded. People will risk a lot to prevent a loss, but risk very little for a possible gain.”

“Our Lord has written the promise of the resurrection not in books alone, but in every leaf in springtime.”

“The ignorant man marvels at the exceptional;  
the wise man marvels at the common;  
the greatest wonder of all is the regularity of nature.”

“The soft tongue breaketh the bone, the tamed tongue subdues the adversity.”

“The age of chivalry is never past, so long as there is a wrong left undressed on earth... The age of chivalry is never past, so long as we have faith enough to say, God will help me to redress that wrong; or, if not me, He will help those that come after me, for His eternal will is to overcome evil with good.”

“Worry, the great American disease.”

“Worry is the most popular form of suicide. Worry impairs appetite, disturbs sleep, warps character,

weakens the mind.”

“What can teachers and parents do to encourage and stimulate the growth of their students’ ‘internal motivation’... First, parents and teachers must find ways to make certain what we are teaching is relevant, and answer ‘why do we have to learn this stuff’, and then ‘when are we going to use this in the real world.’”

“Mental filtering or negative filtering is the action of selecting something negative, dwelling exclusively on it, and drawing conclusions based exclusively on the negative premises.”

“Bureaucratic institutions, whether corporations or government agencies, promote self-deception that may result in disaster for many persons.”

“The people most likely to succeed in the bureaucratic or corporate environment are those who allow themselves to be manipulated.”

“When people perceive themselves as objects to be molded to fit external criteria for organizational ends, they find it easier to see others as objects to be used... Such people master the rhetoric and vocabulary of the organization... Personal identity and values are sacrificed, self-deceptively rationalized for the good of the corporation.”

“Many people, in a mutually self-deceptive mode, often relinquish reality testing and turn decisions to those who appear to be omniscient and omnipotent. This phenomenon is seen in times of economic and political unrest when the populace will endow a strong leader with unreasonable powers.”

“A few narcissistic individuals in their grandiosity believe and convince others that they are such powerful figures. Their lives reinforce the self-deception of others, with potentially disastrous results.”

“The advantages of lying may increase power and wealth... wide-scale deceptive advertising programs are effective.”

“The successful lie can increase self-esteem... Lying may also maintain the self-deception of another person, making it possible to manipulate that person for one’s own personal gain.”

“People who use deception to manipulate the self-deception of others may be attempting to harness social forces in order to increase their own personal power. They may feed another person’s prejudice.”

“Deceit may be detrimental to society as a whole when it creates misinformation that is difficult to correct.”

“Jesus was a uniquely insurgent Jew, and thus his main critique was against certain Jewish teachings and groups within his own community. All this indicates that the Christian mission in society should start from within. The change should first take place in the Christian community itself. This is also true for Islam. The Qur’an says:

{Lo! Allah changes not the condition of a folk until they change that which is in themselves}”

“Jesus was executed by the Romans according to specific charges:

- 1- inciting a revolution.
- 2- advocating tax resistance.
- 3- claiming authority to set up an alternate government to the State.”

{We found this man inciting our people to revolt, opposing payment of the tribute to Ceasar, and claiming to be Christ, a king.} (Luke 23:2)

“Contemplation without resistance to an unjust social order is a form of spiritual sterility and capitulation.”

“Capitalist society which bombs abroad and consumes at home.”

“The basis of liberation can be found in solitude. In solitude, the depths of a man’s own aloneness lie the resources to injustice.”

“For a man to take responsibility in public for his society, he must have deeper integrity to take responsibility for his own inner life.”

“Our solidarity with the oppressed is the very basis of our own humanity.”

“The Greek word ‘Kosmos’ means order, hence the English word ‘Cosmos’, the word also containing overtones of ‘beauty’, from which ‘cosmetic’ has its origin.”

“Plutarch speaks of God as the absolute Reality who exists beyond time.”

“Plotinus concludes: We maintain, and it is evident truth, that the One is everywhere and yet nowhere.”

“May – the month of gladness – youth, love, song, and all that is beautiful in life.”

“Nagging – the constant repetition of an unpleasant truth.”

“November – No warmth, no cheerfulness, no healthful ease, no comfortable fee in any member – No shade, no shine, no butterflies, no bees, no fruits, no flowers, no leaves no birds, no-venber.”

“A great banker once said: Buy when others are anxious to sell, and sell when others are anxious to buy. That’s the way to get rich.”

“Unlimited ownership, as an institution, is an incentive to greed.”

“A child never enjoys his toy unless he knows it is his own, to keep. This conception to keep is magical.”

“Many internet trolls are ‘everyday sadists’.”

“‘Everyday sadist’ is to emphasize the sub-clinical levels of sadism, and not the more extreme forms that are seen in serial killers and criminals.”

“The essential aspect of sadism is the enjoyment of cruelty... Hurting people is exciting.”

“Sadism rate high on the dark triad: narcissism, psychopathology, Machiavellianism.”

“Trolls are often insatiably nasty. There is no reasoning with them. Don’t feed the trolls.”

“Aggressive behavior brings emotional pain to the sadist, the mood of the aggressor goes down following the event.”

“The soul, by its sense of right, or its perception of moral distinctions, is clothed with sovereignty over itself, and through it alone it understands and recognizes the Sovereign of the universe.”

“Let us not disparage that nature which is common to all men; for no thought can measure its grandeur... He who possesses the divine powers of the soul is a great being, be his place what it may. You may clothe him with rags, may immerse him in a dungeon, may chain him with slavish tasks. Be he is still great.”

“When self-focus is disrupted, then egocentrism may promote dehumanization.”

“Perceived threat moderates the effect of dehumanization on the endorsement of aggression.”

“Dehumanizing perceptions of individuals or groups may reduce prosocial behavior toward them and increase antisocial behavior toward them.”

“The consequence of dehumanizing perceptions is to confer diminished moral standing on people.”

“We can overcome dehumanization by intergroup contact and by emphasizing a common identity and shared fate and de-emphasizing boundaries.”

“Dehumanization is so common and yet so dire in consequences. It is the most striking violation of our belief in common humanity.”

“Dehumanization can be blatant or subtle; driven by hate, lust, or indifference; collectively organized or intensely personal.”
